## Esther: Part 2



It is easy to underestimate the \_\_\_\_\_ of one person to impact a community, shape a culture, or make a difference in our world.

Throughout the Bible, God chose to use individual men and women to flow His power through to accomplish His purposes. They were not perfect people, but they were \_\_\_\_\_ people.

### **Esther 4:1–15**

Esther was an orphaned Jewish girl living in exile who by God's providence became queen and the rescuer of her people. She went from being a nobody to a somebody, then to a \_\_\_\_\_ in God's plan.
