The Miracles of Jesus: Part 6

"But these things are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have eternal life."—John 20:31

The story of the man born blind is a story of man who had lived his entire life in darkness. His encounter with Jesus leads us to consider a different way of thinking. We should think of our dark times in a redemptive way, always asking how God can be glorified.

John 9:1-7

Changing Our Thinking About Dark Times

- 1. Dark Times provide an opportunity for the assurance that God is ______. (Vs. 1)
- In our darkest times God sees us and is at work in us.
- God comes to us in our darkness when we can't see our way to Him.
- 2. Dark times are best seen as ______
 for God to work a miracle. (Vs. 2–3)
- Instead of demanding an explanation, allow God's divine purpose to be revealed.
- Instead of asking, "Why is this happening?" ask, "What does God want to do?"

- Jesus came to bring His transforming light into our dark times.
- God will use our dark times to reveal the greatness of His lifegiving power.
- 4. Dark times allow us to see that God is ______in the way He works miracles. (Vs. 6)
- God's miracle of bringing light into darkness is a matter of faith, not formula.
- The means by which the miracle takes place overrides the actions by which it occurs.
- 5. Dark times provide opportunities for us to respond to God with actions. (Vs. 7)
- The blind man would not have received his sight if he not responded by washing.
- When we respond to God with faith-filled actions His light can overwhelm our darkness.

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Read John 9:1-7
